Zacchaeus

Introduction

Luke 19:1-10

- 1. This is the account of a rich man by the name of Zacchaeus.
- 2. Zacchaeus was a chief publican--whose name means, "the true or just."
 - A. He overcame much and received the Lord's own word that he was saved.
- 3. The setting is Jericho. This has been referred to as the "Eden of Palestine."
 - A. With the mountains of Moab serving as the Eastern backdrop. Rose gardens, a luxurious fortress and palace built by Herod the Great and son.
 - B. It was an important trade center, balsam a chief product and a city of beauty, roses, sycamore trees, palms.
 - C. It is here that one finds a large customs house, with Zacchaeus, being the chief publican. Jesus entered and passed through Jericho.
- 4. There are many things about him and his circumstances that help us understand a lot about ourselves. This morning, let us consider some things about Zacchaeus:

His Need of Salvation

- 1. The success that Zacchaeus enjoyed was not enough then nor is it enough now.
- 2. Sin is the common curse of mankind and salvation is the great equalizer.

Romans 3:23 for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God,

Jude 3 Beloved, while I was very diligent to write to you concerning our common salvation, I found it necessary to write to you exhorting you to contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints.

3. Please observe that after Jesus told Zacchaeus that salvation had come to his house, He said these words:

Luke 19:10 for the Son of Man has come to seek and to save that which was lost."

4. The first lesson from Zacchaeus is that we all need more than wealth and success in this life.

Hindrances He Overcame

- 1. His wealth.
 - A. Jesus had just said:

Luke 18:24-26 And when Jesus saw that he became very sorrowful, He said, "How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God! For it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." And those who heard it said, "Who then can be saved?"

- B. Far too often riches lead to indulgence and indifference about salvation.
- C. It is not the riches of themselves that are evil; it is the trust one puts in those riches which hinders one in being saved.

1 Timothy 6:10 For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, for which some have strayed from the faith in their greediness, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows.

PATRICK HENRY: "I have now disposed of all my property to my family. There is one thing more I wish I could give them and that is faith in Jesus Christ. If they had that and I had not given them a single shilling, they would have been rich; and if they had not that, and I had given them all the world, they would be poor indeed."

- 2. His occupation.
 - A. Every Christian should ask, does my job hinder my salvation.
 - In the case of Zacchaeus' occupation as a chief publican, most probably expected graft, dishonesty and bribery from such a position.
 - 2) But Zacchaeus, evidently was free from such.
 - B. One may work that which is good, or let a job overcome the good influences of God's Word.
- 3. His physical limitations: smallness overcome by climbing a tree.
 - A. Anyone thoroughly earnest about their soul will allow nothing to hinder them.
 - B. Jesus looks at the heart--not the outward man.

Blessings He Received.

- 1. Salvation. Deliverance from the penalty of sin.
- 2. Fellowship with the Lord.
- 3. The same is available to every person today.

1 Timothy 2:3-4 For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

A. We learn from the word of God that salvation is conditional. One must abide in the "doctrine of Christ."

2 John 9-10 Whoever transgresses and does not abide in the doctrine of Christ does not have God. He who abides in the doctrine of Christ has both the Father and the Son. If anyone comes to you and does not bring this doctrine, do not receive him into your house nor greet him;

The Response He Made

- 1. I give half of my goods to the poor.
 - A. "The present, 'I give,' expressed the fixedness of his resolve; for however the distribution of his goods is still in the future, that future to him is as though actually present."

 (R.C. Trench, Studies in the Gospel, p. 275)
 - B. "A purpose, not a past habit."
- 2. "If I have taken anything from anyone by false accusation, I restore fourfold."
 - A. This is more than all Jews were legally bound to do.

Numbers 5:7 then he shall confess the sin which he has committed. He shall make restitution for his trespass in full, plus one-fifth of it, and give it to the one he has wronged.

- B. Here is the fruit of a completely changed man.
- C. A change can take place in anyone -- if one is willing to come to Christ on His terms.

Conclusion

1. The publicans were excommunicated by the Jews.

Matthew 18:17 And if he refuses to hear them, tell it to the church. But if he refuses even to hear the church, let him be to you like a heathen and a tax collector.

- A. They were not allowed in any part of worship, nor any religious exercise of the Jews.
- B. But Jesus calls him also "a son of, Abraham."
- 2. The greatest lesson from this small man is that earnestness of spirit will prevail.
 - A. Half-heartedness or mere impulsiveness of action will fail.
- 3. The right attitude: "God be merciful to me a sinner."
 - A. It is quite possible, even likely, that Jesus had Zacchaeus in mind in this parable.

Luke 18:9-14

- 4. Jesus wants all of us to hear His great invitation! Listen to it and respond in a positive way as Zacchaeus did.
 - A. Eternity, a home in heaven, awaits all those who do!

Matthew 11:28-30 Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light."
